| Day 1 | Dublin. Arrive Dublin Airport by 10:00AM, where we will meet our driver guide. We will take a panoramic tour of Dublin City. See all of the |
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| October 13 | historical buildings, you will pass by St. Patrick's Cathedral, the tallest church in Ireland. You will have to check out the Temple Bar Pub area. Be |
| Sunday | sure to see the famous Red Pub. After touring a bit, we will stop at Guinness Storehouse. It's more than just a brewery. The Guinness Storehouse |
| | experience is part brewery tour and part museum, ending with a pint at a rooftop bar overlooking Dublin. Guinness is said to be the top tourist |
| | attraction in all of Ireland, and it's fun and interesting whether or not you like Guinness (though, note that my beer-loving friends all say that the |
| | Guinness in Ireland tastes WAY better than the Guinness we get in the US!). We will enjoy a tour along with a pint of Guinness, of course. |
| | Tonight, we all will have dinner together at your hotel. Dinner & Overnight at the Camden Court Hotel. |
| Day2 | Dublin- Kinsale. This morning we leave Dublin and head to Kinsale. Our first visit will be to the Cobh Heritage Center. Explore the poignant |
| October 14 | Emigration & Maritime Story at Cobh. The dramatic exhibition brings to life the origins, history and legacy of Cobh and its role in Irish |
| Monday | emigration as well as tales of the ill-fated Titanic and Lusitania. Retrace the steps of 2.5 million adults and children who emigrated from Ireland |
| | through Cobh on coffin ships, early steamers and finally on the great ocean liners. Discover the real stories of some of the 6 million emigrants who |
| | left Ireland from 1848 to 1950, making Cobh the single most important port of emigration in Ireland. Cobh can be a very moving place to visit. |
| | Then it is onto Killarney overnight. Overnight at The Actons Hotel. |
| Day3 | Kinsale. Today we will visit Dingle in this picturesque little town. After breakfast at your hotel, we have time to visit Charles Fort, a popular |
| October 15 | attraction that was constructed in the late 17th century on the site of an earlier coastal fortification. Charles Fort is a classic example of a star- |
| Tuesday | shaped fort and has five bastions. The two seaward bastions, the Devil's and the Charles' were for defending the harbor and both are casemated - |
| | that is, they have gun embrasures inside as well as on top of the walls. Desmond Castle, (French Prison) was built as a custom house by the Earl of |
| | Desmond c. AD 1500. The Castle has had a colorful history, ranging from Spanish occupation in 1601 to use as a prison for captured American |
| | sailors during the American War of independence. Known locally as 'The French Prison' after a tragic fire in which 54 prisoners, mainly French |
| | seamen, died in 1747. This afternoon we will have the option of enjoying a gourmet Walking Food Tour of Kinsale. Those of you not |
| | wishing to take part of the food tour are free to explore Kinsale on your own. Some of Ireland's most award-winning restaurants are in Kinsale |
| | and our walking food tour will take us to some of them. As we walk through this beautiful medieval coastal town, you will experience a range of |
| | different local foods. You will hear stories about the food and the town. We will be enjoying an adult beverage paired with some of our tastings |
| D. 4 | today. Overnight at The Actons Hotel. |
| Day4 | Kinsale- Dingle- Killarney. After breakfast we head to the Dingle Peninsula. The journey begins with some of the most magnificent scenery in |
| | all Ireland. The little town of Dingle is straight out of a story book. The fishing boats in the harbor and tiny brightly painted pubs portray a time |
| Wednesday | that has continued to stand still. The population of 1500 people and only 52 pubs are ready to welcome you this afternoon. Worth the wait is the |
| | native seafood chowder served up at lunchtime with freshly baked brown bread. We continue on to Slea Head. Along the way, we will see beehive |
| | style huts, originally inhabited by 12 th century monks, which overlook the rugged Blasket Islands. The awe-inspiring beauty of this particular |
| | area is unmatched. There is no other landscape in western Europe with the density and variety of archaeological monuments as found on the |
| | Dingle Peninsula. We then head to Killarney for overnight. Overnight at the Killarney International Hotel. |

| Day5 October 17 Thursday | Killarney-Blarney Castle- Killarney. Today we set out for a visit to Blarney Castle, which is home to the blarney stone. If you need proof of the power of a good yarn, then join the queue to get into this 15th-century castle, one of Ireland's most popular tourist attractions. They're here, of course, to plant their lips on the Blarney Stone, which supposedly gives one the gift of gab. The Blarney Stone is perched at the top of a steep climb up claustrophobic spiral staircases. On the battlements, you bend backwards over a long, long drop (with safety grill and attendant to prevent tragedy) to kiss the stone (STONE & CASTLE ARE OPTIONAL); Time to visit and shop the famous woolen mills. This shop shouldn't disappoint, with a particularly wide range of cut crystal, porcelain presents and its trademark woolly things. Save your appetite as this afternoon we will stop at The English Market in Cork. The English Market - so called because it was set up in 1788 by the Protestant or 'English' corporation that then controlled the city (there was once an Irish Market nearby) - is a true gem, with its ornate vaulted ceilings, columns, and polished marble fountain. Scores of vendors set up colorful and photogenic displays of the region's very best local produce, including meat, fish, fruit, cheeses, and takeaway food. This is a must see not just for foodies! Overnight at Killarney International Hotel. |
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| Day6 | Dingle- Dublin. This morning we leave Dingle and head north towards Dublin. On our way we will make a stop in Wicklow. Around 22 miles |
| October 18 | south of Dublin on Ireland's east coast, Wicklow is known as the "Garden of Ireland." And with good reason. It's one of the most beautiful |
| Friday | regions in the country, offering rolling mountains, a national park, high waterfalls, beautiful sandy beaches, and dramatic, untamed scenery. From there we head into Dublin. Welcome back to Dublin, a city that's as intimate as a village and as friendly as an Irish pub. Framed by mountains, centered on a river and edged by a beautiful bay, the city's streets and alleys are filled with vibrant art, historic buildings, and hip cafes. This afternoon you may want to visit the Jameson Distillery, nestled in the heart of Old Dublin on the site of the original distillery, with its origins dating back to the year 1780. We also get a complimentary whiskey tasting. Overnight at the Camden Court Hotel. |
